Spelling Patterns:

Doubling Final Consonant



When a short vowel is followed by a consonant at the end of a word, we usually double the final consonant before adding a vowel suffix (-ing, -ed, -er, -est, -y, etc.).

Example: run → run**ning** • stop → stop**ped** • big → big**ger**
